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# Letter from the Board Chair

The past year has been one of growth and learning for United Way NWT. It was a year where our role as a connector came into focus—bringing people together, supporting communities in recovery, and co-designing paths forward. None of this would have been possible without the tremendous support of our donors, partners, volunteers, and, community members, all of whom have ensured that our work has continued to meet the needs of Northerners.

The central theme of this year’s Annual Report is convening and collaboration. In the wake of the 2023 wildfires, communities sought spaces to share lessons and prepare for the future. We responded through two gatherings: READY NWT, co-hosted with the Canadian Red Cross in October 2024, and Resilient Together, a four-day gathering in April 2025. Both focused on psychosocial wellness, service continuity, and emergency preparedness in communities, building on the strengths and relationships that strengthen Northern resilience.

Concurrently, our core programs continued to provide community support across the NWT through our Community Investment Fund and our Emergency Funding Program, which shifted from immediate response in 2023 to supporting recovery in 2024.

This work was made possible thanks to the generosity of donors and partners. From federal and territorial workplace giving campaigns, to community events, major charitable giving and individual donations—support came from every corner of the North and beyond.

The past year also marked a transition in board leadership, with Paul Gillard completing his term as Board Chair. We thank Paul for his steady leadership through times of challenge and tireless advocacy for the well-being of Northern communities.

Guided by our values of community, inclusiveness, integrity, and service, United Way NWT will continue to bring people together, strengthen organizations, invest in local resilience, and promote the organized capacity of people in the North to care for one another.

# Main Theme: Convening for Community Resilience

In the wake of the 2023 wildfires, it became clear that preparing for future emergencies could not be done in isolation. Northern communities expressed their need for space to come together, share lessons learned, and plan for future emergencies. This past year, United Way NWT helped create those spaces by convening gatherings with partners.

This past year, United Way NWT helped create those spaces by convening gatherings with partners and communities to focus on strengthening emergency preparedness, service continuity, and psychosocial wellness.

## Ready NWT Gathering: Strengthening Preparedness Together



In October 2024, United Way NWT supported the Canadian Red Cross in hosting **READY NWT**, a two-day gathering in Yellowknife that brought together community organizations, local leaders and territorial representatives to explore how we can be stronger together in times of crisis.

Participants mapped organizational strengths, identified critical gaps, and tested assumptions through a simulated power outage exercise. The gathering created a collaborative space to share insights, build new connections, and highlight the vital role of local organizations in emergency response.

## Resilient Together Conference: Strengthening NWT Communities



Public Safety Canada's Investing in the NWT's Emergency Response program and the NWTAC. This event brought together 45 participants, including Indigenous governments, NGOs, service providers, and community leaders.

Through storytelling, reflection, and design sessions, participants mapped hazards, envisioned resilient futures, and co-created practical actions around food security, housing, communication, and youth engagement. The gathering also included Red Cross-led training in service continuity planning and **Psychological First Aid certification**, equipping participants with skills to support emotional well-being during crises.

# United Way NWT's Donation-Funded Programs

## Emergency Funding Program

Over the past year, United Way NWT's **Emergency Funding Program** shifted from immediate crisis response to supporting recovery. Grants helped communities, non-profits, and Indigenous governments sustain their work long after the 2023 wildfire evacuations, focusing on rebuilding stability and resilience across the Northwest Territories.



## Community Investment Fund

In 2024/25, United Way NWT awarded **\$205,000** in grants to 21 non-profit organizations, of which 17 were one-year grants of \$7,500 and 4 were part of ongoing multi-year agreements of up to \$15,000. These investments reflect our continued commitment to community-driven solutions across our three focus areas: From Poverty to Possibility, Healthy People, Strong Communities, and All That Kids Can Be.



This year, the Northern Birthwork Collective began a new three-year grant to expand access to Indigenous birthworkers and perinatal support services. Ongoing agreements with the Hay River Committee for Persons with Disabilities, the Hamlet of Ulukhaktok, and the Hay River Family Support Centre also continued, providing stability for organizations supporting their communities.

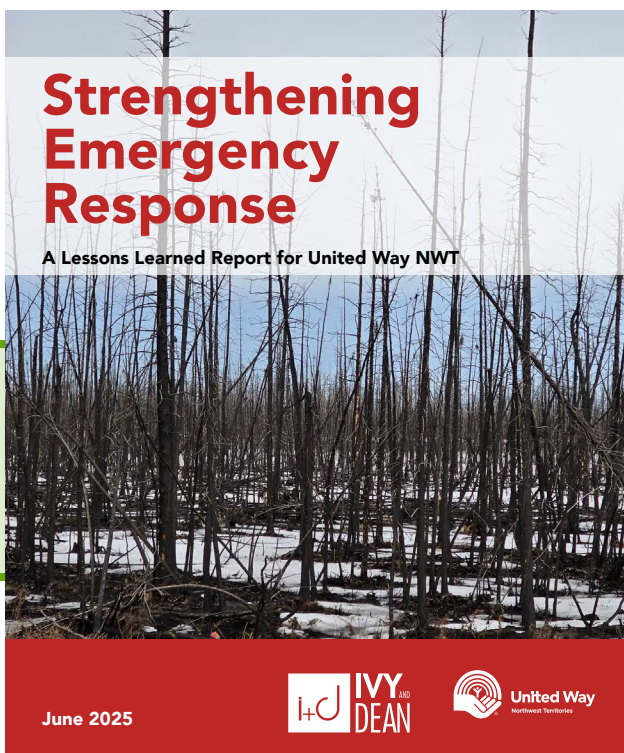
# Additional Spotlights from 2024/25

## Emergency Response: A Lessons Learned Report

Alongside recovery funding, we also took a step back to reflect on our progress. Following the unprecedented 2023 wildfire season, we recognized that resilience meant more than just response—it meant learning, adapting, and preparing for the future.

In June 2025, United Way NWT released the [\*\*Strengthening Emergency Response: A Lessons Learned Report\*\*](#), compiled by Ivy + Dean Consulting. This report drew on community consultations, government interviews, surveys with our board and staff, and reflections from our Resilient Together gathering. The findings confirm what many already know:

- Emergency grants are trusted, fast, and accessible.
- Relationships matter, and dedicated, available staff were difference makers during crisis moments.
- Gaps remain, and more consistent communication and clearer processes are needed.
- The future requires readiness: stronger internal capacity, deeper engagement with Indigenous governments, and clarified roles are essential.



This work led to the development of a Readiness Toolkit and new policies to guide future emergency efforts, ensuring that the lessons learned in 2023 are implemented.

## Investing in the NWT's Emergency Response (Federal Program)

In December 2024, United Way NWT launched **Investing in the NWT's Emergency Response**, a 30-month, **\$1.472 million** program supported by Public Safety Canada, creating space for collaboration around emergency preparedness and response, grounded in Northern voices.

### SPOTLIGHTS

- **Bringing people together:** Hosting the Resilient Together gathering in April 2025, which convened NGOs, Indigenous governments, and service providers to co-design resilience strategies.
- **Supporting long-term recovery:** Investing **\$850,000** in Hay River's agricultural restoration, rebuilding farming infrastructure devastated by floods and wildfires, and helping re-establish Hay River as the "Agriculture Hub of the North."

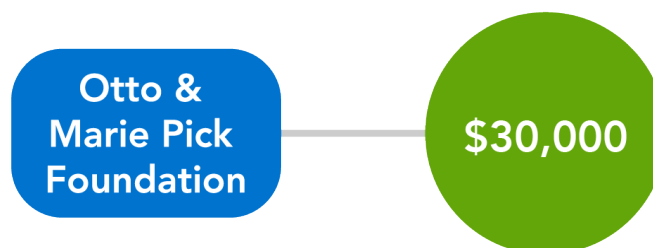
## Workplace Giving

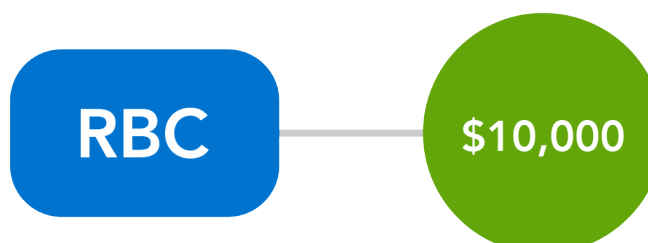
## Major Contributions: Community Investment Fund

Our Community Investment Fund was bolstered by two significant contributions in 2024:

- The **Otto & Marie Pick Foundation** generously donated **\$30,000** in December 2024. This gift was especially meaningful as we honoured the legacy of the Foundation's beloved founder, Tom Pick, whose vision made this support possible.



- **RBC** contributed **\$10,000** in November 2024, helping expand opportunities for Northern charities and nonprofits to deliver programs that empower youth, strengthen families, and build healthy communities.





## Community Events & Campaigns

Across the North, community members also came together to raise funds and increase awareness, showcasing how collective action can lead to real change:

- In June of 2024, **Bartle & Gibson** marked their 80th anniversary by hosting a wonderful community event with donation boxes supporting both our Emergency Response and Community Investment Fund.
- In March 2025, Northerners came together for **Tampon Tuesday**, collecting pads, tampons, and other menstrual hygiene products at local partners including **For Women Only**, **Yellowknife Co-op**, and the **Yellowknife Racquet Club**. This community effort made period products more accessible, challenged stigma, and ensured that no one in our community goes without basic essentials.
